- 7. "Immediate pleasure often loses sight of the future" (Life Application Study Bible, p. 47). "Those who cannot see beyond the moment forfeit their future" (Lawrence Richards, <u>The Bible Reader's Companion</u>, p. 40). What are some ways to keep the future in front of you when faced with these temptations?

Esau (25:25). Sounds like "hairy." His other name **Edom** (25:30) sounds like "red."

Jacob (25:26). Literally, "May he be at the heels"; in other words, "May God be your rearguard [protector]." But the name could also be taken as describing a person who dogs another's steps, supplants, deceives, or betrays. In a good sense, it could name a man who holds tenaciously to his goals and duties.
